

SCEPTRE 12 - K17 THE BRITISH 1958 AMERICA'S CUP CHALLENGER

Ceptre was designed for the Royal Yacht Squadron by David Boyd and built at Alexander Robertson's yard in Sandbank, Holy Loch on the Clyde, for the 1958 America's Cup, the first to be sailed to the International 12 Metre Rule.

Following Sceptre's America's Cup campaign, her mast's position was modified and she subsequently enjoyed a number of years very successful racing in British waters. Later, she was converted for cruising, and now has 12 berths, two heads, shower, galley, fridge, cooker and warm air heating. There is standing room throughout, a little restricted towards the forward two berths.

She has full electronic navigation aids including radar, VHF/DSC radio and GPS. Sceptre holds a current MCA Small Commercial Vessel certificate. Her skippers are qualified RYA Yachtmasters with commercial endorsement.

Since 1986 Sceptre has been maintained, sailed and enjoyed by members of the **Sceptre Preservation Society**. Currently numbering 19, the syndicate welcomes applications from like-minded enthusiasts who would relish the challenge of looking after, and sailing, this historic yacht. 


hether on the Solent, the Clyde or the West Coast of Scotland, Sceptre is recognised and admired wherever she goes.
